	The criteria for granting the Right of First Refusal for in chartering of vessels through tender process has been revised, for promoting tonnage under Indian flag and shipbuilding in India, so as to make India an Atmanirbhar/self-reliant Bharat, in terms of tonnage and ship-building in India. The following is the revised hierarchy of RoFR:  a. Indian built, Indian flagged and Indian owned

4.2	India Maldives Shipping Service:
